This risk assessment is used for identifying and controlling hazards of activities. A hazard is anything that has the potential to cause harm and a risk is the likelihood of it causing harm and the degree of harm it could cause. This means assessing the possible risk to employees, volunteers, and visitors and specifying the actions necessary to reduce or eliminate the risk.

After touching any animals, children must not touch their face, in particular mouth, until they have washed their hands. School/group staff must supervise children's handwashing. Open wounds should be covered with a waterproof dressing. Pregnant school/group staff should avoid contact with pregnant sheep, goats or new born lambs and kids. Rooms are kept locked when not in use. 'No entry' sign displayed. Tools stored securely when not in use. Groups only to use tools with permission and after instruction. Wearing PPE as necessary.
	Kitchen- scalding from hot water	3	1	3	Children are not permitted to entre the kitchen unless supervised by SCF staff. Children are not permitted to use the kettle or any other form of heating equipment.

School/group staff are responsible for supporting individuals within their group and should discuss with SCF staff any known allergies prior to the visit.





Tree House/ play area	Falling, tripping,	4	2	8	School/ group staff/ adults to supervise use of Tree House at all times and to maintain safe behaviour and appropriate uses. SCF make regular checks of tree house condition; reporting and fixing as necessary.
Fire Pit	Burns, smoke inhalation	3	2	6	Fire is only to be lit by trained SCF staff member or under their supervision. Matches/ lighter should be held or recovered by SCF staff or responsible adult at all times. SCF staff or responsible adult/ volunteer will always be present, until the fire is put out. Matches/ lighters are to be stored in a safe and appropriate location; out of reach of children. Water bucket to be present at all times in case needed. Children to maintain a 1 metre distance from the fire pit at all times.
Wood burning stove in yurt	Burns, smoke inhalation	3	2	6	Guard is kept around stove at all times; children/adults briefed about dangers from chimney. Fire extinguisher, smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarm in place in yurt and regularly tested. Only SCF staff and responsible adults are to operate wood burning stove. Children to maintain a 1 metre distance from the stove at all times.





Open water	infection from pond water	4	1	4	Groups to bring appropriate child to adult ratio and to encourage safe behaviour around the Farm.
					Contact with the water and activities around pond (such as pond dipping) only to occur by arrangement and under supervision of SCF staff and volunteers.
					Hand washing facilities are provided that everyone should use before eating, drinking and/or leaving the farm.
	Hypothermia or drowning	5	2	10	Appropriate and adequate fencing should be installed around all open water. Appropriate signage displayed warning all of hazard.
					Groups to bring appropriate child to adult ratio and children should be supervised by group staff at all times.
					Should be a trained member of staff onsite at all times to administer appropriate first aid in the event of a child falling in open water.

					All hands to be washed upon entering the farm site when taking public transport and exiting the farm site. A staff member will be available to meet a school to direct them to handwashing and toilet facilities on arrival. No food should be shared between SCF and the visiting group.
	Unable to maintain social distance	4	1	4	Schools/ group visits are required to book visits to the farm so we can ensure that school bubbles do not mix. Maximum of 30 students per school group. Activities with school groups will be contained to certain areas of the farm to ensure minimal opportunity for engagement with the general public.
Weather	Cold, wet or very hot weather	2	2	4	All visitors should be advised to bring appropriate clothing for weather conditions, e.g waterproofs if raining, hat and scarf if cold, sun hat and sunblock if sunny. Shelter areas can be booked to help protect visitors against the elements if required. Non-bookable areas are also available.
Pollen	Hay fever.	1	3	3	School/ group staff should be aware and are responsible of those who suffer from hay fever and make themselves aware of the pollen count prior to the visit if necessary.

PLEASE NOTE:

- *All groups and volunteers must sign in and out of the Farm and attend the Health and Safety briefing before the session commences.
- *Maximum numbers in a group to be negotiated with Farm Manager prior to arrival. Staffing levels will be appropriate to the number in the group to provide suitable supervision.
- *A number of our staff are First Aid trained and any activities involving an open fire will begin with a Health & Safety briefing. All teams are supervised by a member of staff who will be on site for the duration of the tasks. All members of staff are Disclosure and Barring Service checked.





* When carried out safely, an open fire can offer children an acceptable risk activity to enhance their learning opportunities and own coping strategies. If we only provide a sanitised environment and risk adverse activities, children will not explore and discover the world for themselves, they will only experience a safety conscious environment. However safeguards must be in place to ensure the activity is at an appropriate level for their abilities and understanding without turning the activity into a safety first pursuit.
